COVID-19 PANDEMIC

As 8pm approached on Thursday, 26th March 2020, people appeared at open doors and windows some holding a pan and a spoon. On the hour they started to clap, some banging the pan with the spoon. It was very different from the ringing of church bells and the lighting of beacons. And the reason was different too. The nation was in lockdown, household isolation, to prevent the rapid spread of corona virus, COVID-19, the cause of a pandemic.

In hospitals, National Health Service (NHS) staff were working day and night, fighting to save the lives of patients infected with the virus and at risk of losing their own life. And the nation was showing its gratitude.

For many the televised scenes and the accounts by hospital staff would be the enduring image, end of life scenes of patients dying with no family or friends at their bedside, instead, caring and understanding hospital staff forming this last link.

The pandemic came to a much divided world, and to a British society losing social cohesion and with many disadvantaged. Yet the world is otherwise a global village: climate change, pollution, electronic communication, trade, movement of people.

And what of our response?


We saw the best in people and we saw the worst. There was no hiding place. Tarnished images were exposed, the good in others revealed, and it is the latter which will be first remembered, perhaps with a little surprise, where neighbours had been strangers.

We saw more clearly the disadvantaged: the homeless; the homes without the internet or without information technology (IT) skills to enable working from home, communication and home schooling; the homes without gardens or with multiple occupancy of rooms; the homes threatened with loss of employment.

But we also saw more clearly the many who give generously of their time, talents and possessions: the elderly who telephoned someone isolating alone; the young who gave electronic communication advice under the supervision of a responsible adult; the large number of people who acted as a delivery service. The Queen broadcast words of comfort and hope. We saw in practice the second great commandment of Jesus, 'Love your neighbour as you love yourself.'

It was a time for Christians, empowered by the Holy Spirit, to be visible as under-shepherds of Jesus, caring for his flock, to be ambassadors of Christ bringing the Gospel message, the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God, and so to bring comfort to those who are alone, to those who suffer, to those who mourn and so be like Jesus when he walked on this earth.

The open space of God

Trinity is a special Sunday for the Benefice (it is in our name!) and marks the anniversary of one of the most memorable and joyful services during my curacy.

Last year among the wonderful puppets, choirs and coming together of the three churches was an Absolution based on Romans 5: 3–5. It is from *The Message* translation of the bible and captures the joy of salvation in the phrase "We find ourselves standing... in the wide open spaces of God's grace". Our two readings for today describe the Christian communities response to that grace in fellowship and worship. This year we are physically separated and we might reflect on how we can "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit". What does this mean when we cannot baptize or greet each other with a holy kiss?

Andy touches on this reality in his letter below. We are a long way from a return to anything we would recognise as 'normal' in all areas of life, including the life of the church. The change of everything is exactly what faced the disciples after the resurrection. It is reassuring that some even doubted what they were seeing. Hardly a surprising reaction! The life of resurrection was about to become the 'new normal', our extraordinary normal. This new life does not leave us alone or unable to 'obey everything that I have commanded you', the greatest being to love. We participate in the mutual love of the Trinity, the self giving of God. We baptise through our care of others, greet with holy kisses via the telephone and continue as a community found 'in the wide open spaces of God's grace'. As the disciples stood in awe worshipping the risen Jesus they must have also wondered what was next? How would they live and worship? What would their new community look like? Maybe they grieved for the loss of certainty and the suffering that was to come? Maybe we are doing the same, but we do it with the promise 'I am with you always'. Bob

Message from Andy

Over the last few weeks as there has been a gradual opening up of society from lock-down a number of congregation members have asked when churches are going to open up again. I thought I would write a short note from my perspective and from what I have been told in order to help people see where we are and where we might be going over the coming months.

Bob's secondment

We had planned for me to be on secondment during May, June and July. The main purpose was to stretch my learning and cover for the Revd Diane Flynn in Swillington who is in need of an operation. Her op coincided with Kippax being in a vacancy. With her op cancelled due to Coronavirus it was felt sensible that I stayed put. With restrictions slowly lifting Diane's operation has been rescheduled for June 17th. With her need to stay in isolation +Paul asked if I could help at Kippax, Swillington and Allerton-by-Water with immediate effect until the end of July. Obviously this is not a normal situation as all worship is online. I will be continuing Diane's schedule of live daily worship on Facebook (9.30am, 12noon and 5pm, Monday to Thursday) and a Sunday service at 10.30am. Diane also works closely with local schools and leads a weekly Zoom bible study. I will also be providing pastoral support, looking at the opening of their buildings and taking funerals. This will mean I won't available in the Benefice but I am planning on working with our teams to bring us Messy Church, All Saint's All Stars and Dad's Club as planned during June and July. In the meantime you will all be in my prayers and I look forward to sharing with you all I learn in the eight weeks I am 'away'. Blessings, Bob

The current plan is that the shelter will move to Garforth Methodist Church for four weeks. The Church Council have agreed overwhelmingly that they are willing for their building to be used for this purpose. This is no easy undertaking in Lockdown situations when our buildings are closed. However the building in Garforth allows social distancing as well as cooking and bathroom facilities. But the team in Garforth can not do this alone. The need for volunteers and support is going to need the team in Garforth as well as us as a Benefice to continue to work together. The net will be thrown wider still to include other local hosts in LS15, in order to reach the level of volunteers that will be needed to run the shelter for up to a month.

So, yet again I am going to be asking you for donations. Thanks to your generosity we are financially able to support the shelter, so thank you. But we are going to need cooks, shoppers, over night volunteers, day time volunteers, donations of cleaning equipment, food and toiletries. I do not have the details as yet as these are still in the planning stages but please if you are willing and able then think and pray about how you can again support the shelter.

It is a testament to your level of generosity and commitment that we have been asked to support the shelter and host again at such a crucial and desperate time for the guests. Please pray for Katrina and the steering group at WYDAN, as well as Rev. Becki and the lead volunteers, Tim and Sue Bean from Garforth Methodist Church. I will be in touch with more details as I have them.

St George's Crypt fundraiser

The Crypt, like many charities is under great strain during Covid-19. Not only are they struggling to raise funds and receive supplies due to the restrictions but the demands on their services have increased considerably in the most difficult of circumstances, including feeding 100 people daily with hot food from the carpark outside the crypt. The first thing to say is that at present only the priest, for private prayer, and certain other essential people are allowed access to the churches (e.g. to check the structure of the building). There has been no indication either from the government or the national church around when more access is likely to be allowed, but the likelihood is that there will be a very gradual and slow opening up of the churches and that 'normal services' are likely to be many months away.

If you think about the things that normally happen in church (shaking hands, sitting close together for up to an hour, drinking from a common cup, singing, chatting over coffee) and who the average congregation member is (generally in the more 'elderly' category) then normal church is a very highrisk activity with a very high-risk group of people. I would suggest that the government and the national church would put normality within church services as one of the very last things to return.

That said, it would bring a great deal of peace and comfort to some people if the churches were open for private prayer, but even this is fraught with danger. Thinking around when to open, for how long, how many are allowed in and how it is policed needs to happen. So even the most simple opening up will need to be thought through carefully. Please be assured each of the three churches are doing some of this thinking and planning in preparation for when churches are allowed to open.

A quote from a recent letter from the Bishop said this: 'advice papers are being worked on to help us prepare for when restrictions are eased: (a) Conducting weddings; (b) Conducting funerals; (c) Individual private prayer by the public; (d) Pastoral visits. These are working documents and I will pass them on when I can.'

It is clear that this is something that is being thought through very carefully both locally and nationally.

A further opening will be to hold small services in church. And in time I'm sure we will be given guidance from both the government and the national church on how this can happen safely.

Another quote from a recent Bishop's letter: 'permission to re-open a building – with restrictions – does not mean you must re-open on the day. You and your PCC must be ready for it and feel ready for it.'

In the meantime we have an abundance of services and events that people can access both on- and off-line, and I would encourage all within the

WYDAN update

As a Benefice we have recently supported the West Yorkshire Destitute Asylum Network (WYDAN) as they continued to provide valuable support to ten homeless asylum seekers through the lockdown.

The support we provided was very different from our hosting in November, where we welcomed the WYDAN guests into the church hall at St. Philips in Scholes. This time we did still provide hot, home cooked meals as well as donations of clothes, extra food, toiletries and money towards phone credit. However, the meals were delivered to the doorstep, the bell rung and then the security guard would come and collect and distribute to individuals. Personally i have not seen any of the guests throughout the three weeks, but have been told that guite a few of the guests who were with us in November were still with the shelter. The guests did relay messages that they were very happy that we were looking after them again and that the food was amazing, with no shepherds pies a welcomed blessing. Our volunteer cooks excelled themselves in the menu choices especially facing food shortages and very difficult shopping experiences. The financial donations were staggering and blew me away. I had to double check with the church treasurer that the amount was accurate. A huge thank you from me and on behalf of the guests. Thank you.

Life in lockdown has not been easy for the gentlemen. They are mixed with other homeless asylum men, a wide range of languages and cultures and these new, untested relationships have proved difficult for the dynamics of the group. There have been issues amongst them as frustration, boredom, combined with Ramadan and uncertainty took hold over the lockdown period. This has been managed by the WYDAN steering group who have had to work alongside the Council to provide support, (pot noddles!) and accommodation for these men.

The Benefice supported WYDAN for three weeks and did so in partnership with the hosting team at Garforth Methodist Church, who's minister Becki Stennett, is also the Methodist minister in Barwick and Scholes. It is the team in Garforth that first inspired and supported the Benefice in its involvement with WYDAN. The partnership allowed us to host for three weeks instead of just one and also made the cooking, shopping, delivering and level of donations more manageable during the shortages of lock down.

Unfortunately with the easing of the lockdown it has been made clear by the Council that they will no longer house the guests and so they will return to the streets of Leeds, without food or shelter. WYDAN have been working hard with all its hosting teams to find a solution. That solution at the
