## **Rector's Report**

Last year feels a very long time ago and it took me a while to remember that there actually was a time before Covid came. Looking back on that year it was personally dominated by my sabbatical, in which I walked the Camino de Santiago de Compostela, presided at the wedding of one of my brothers and spent 6 weeks travelling around China with my family.

I am very thankful that I took my sabbatical last year and not this, as none of those things would have been possible within the pandemic.

The Camino was a real turning point in my spiritual life, a refreshing and renewing of a spiritual thirst that had become somewhat dried by the rigours and strains of Parish ministry. Travelling in China was a blessed time spent with my family before the boys speed off into University and adulthood.

In parish life much of the second half of the year was dominated by the diocesan strategy document which, in its desire to see greater lay participation and spiritual growth, chimed with the reflections I had made on my Camino. Each of the parishes were part-way through looking at how we could put the lessons of the diocesan strategy into practice when Covid and lock-down hit in early 2020. In many ways necessity is the mother of invention and the lock-down gave me the push I needed to really invite many people from across the parishes to be part of the reflections rota, which has been a blessing both to those who listen and those who produce them. Most importantly it has forcefully made the point that we are all on a journey of discovery in our spiritual lives and sometimes need that push to get us out of the door.

Looking to the next 12 months, it is certain that Bob will be moving on in this period of time. I would like to take this opportunity to thank him for the way in which he has thrown himself heart and soul into re-invigorating the worship and life of All Saints' Church in Barwick, as well as having an impact across the benefice.

As I made the point above, that the involvement of the laity is essential to the health of the churches. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all members of the congregations for their contribution, large or small, in whatever way they give, in time, talents or money, to the life and work of the churches of this wonderful benefice. You are all amazing people and have such gifts to give that you are a blessing to me and to each other.

## **Curate's Report**

It seems strange to be sitting here in September 2020, reflecting on 2019. None of us could have foreseen the contrast between the two years or the disruption to our lives due to Covid-19. There are many uncertainties ahead but I have found looking back on 2019 a source of strength as following in the way of Christ we become more of a "Church at the heart of the community".

Personally 2019 was dominated by covering for Andy's Sabbatical. It was a very small taste of what a first incumbency would feel like. The highlight of the year for me was our Benefice Service on Trinity Sunday. All Saints' were good hosts to the whole Benefice. It was interesting to see the different strengths of each church being brought together around the format of the 3rd Sunday all-age Holy Communion service. Choirs, puppets and a full church!

2019 was a year of growth. Keith and Glynis were confirmed at Easter. We have had several Alpha Groups, including study groups preparing three people for Confirmation in 2020 (which has been delayed) and new house groups led by Neale. Our Lent and Advent courses have met in homes, church and the New Inn. We have also seen the growth in the team leading worship, especially over the summer where we managed to continue our midweek services and in the team leading our two monthly all-age services. Thanks to Kathryn, John and Keith (and many others) we have been blessed with thoughtful worship and pastoral care. Our prayer life has been developed by Kathryn who has encouraged us to meet weekly in her and Geoffrey's home.

Maybe the most unexpected development in 2019 was Messy Church. Becki Stennett, the Methodist Minister approached asking to set up a group for the day care children in the village. Soon we also had a group from school and parents. Again, a small team of dedicated volunteers and school teachers have meant we can teach around 25 children through craft, storytelling, prayer and song.

It has been a real joy working ecumenically and has strengthened our ties with school and the community. We have also had new choir members in 2019, including some children. Another highlight of the year was our Christmas services, especially Carols by Candlelight.

This is just a brief mention of a few highlights. There were many more, including *All Saints' All Stars*, our all-age worship twice a month, our super churchyard team and bellringers. We have also had a very supportive PCC. There are two people we should give special thanks to who have worked tirelessly, with great passion and wisdom. They have quietly led the church through hard work and example. I know we are all very grateful to our Churchwardens, Carole and Leslye.

## Treasurer's Report for the year ending December 2019

It cost us £15,017 to run our church this year (an increase of just under £1000 on 2018). This includes lighting, heating, insurance and general internal repairs etc. This figure is on top of our Parish Share of £44,667 and does not include external repairs to the building and surrounding walls, paths etc.

In January, 2019, the annual accounts presented to the PCC and approved by them showed funds brought forward at the beginning of the year of £52,021.55. This included the Central Board of Finance (CBF) Deposit Account of £15,103.15. Our closing balances as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2019 were £42,514.92 a decrease in the year of £9,506.63

The headline figures creating this deficit are as follows:-

The Parish Share for the year was £44,666.64. The level of Parish Giving (covenants/collections/gift aid/donations and tax refund) totalled £42,647.33

Purchase of New Speakers for the Organ £5,770.

- > Funerals raised net income (after payment of fees for verger & organist) was £9,751.20
- > Weddings were up on last year and raised a net figure of £926.00 after deducting diocesan fees/verger/organist/bellringers/stand-in vicars and the cost of the wedding co-ordinator. The PCC has reviewed the overall costs and in future the cost of the wedding co-ordinator will be limited to £100 per month for January & February of 2020. After that the role of wedding co-ordinator is to be included within the duties of the parish administrator.
- > **The Magazine** raised a net figure of **£375.01** after printing costs and this reflects a smaller circulation and advertising spaces which haven't been taken up.
- > The Events Group had another very good year in raising £1,190.55 from events in March and July but other income was raised and put towards the New Organ Speakers.
- > Outward Giving This year we gave £3,000 to local or International Charities

#### **Parish Share**

We have been advised that our Parish Share for 2020 is an increase of 2.8% on 2019. We did not pay the full amount requested in 2019 and although the Diocese have asked for £49,993 for 2020 the PCC has agreed to the 2.8% increase but only on the previous years share paid.

This amounts to £45,917 which needs to be paid in 2020.

## Repairs to the Building

In 2019 we spent £3,417 on necessary work listed in the Quinqennial Review of 2018. We have budgeted for a spend of £8,000 on the building most of which will be spent on refurbishing the clock tower and the clock face itself which is partially covered in gold leaf. We have applied for and received a grant from the Barwick and Scholes Community Fund of £2000 towards this work

The funds in the CBF Deposit account are restricted and in the main can only be used for wall repairs. The main Aberford Road wall continues to show signs of wear and will need money spent on it in the coming months.

#### **New Organ Speakers**

Following the installation of the new organ in 2018 we needed to install new speakers at a cost of

£5,770 to get the best out of the new organ. This has been a priority for fund raising in the current year with the Events committee contributing £1,230.20 from the Harvest Supper and the Christmas Craft fair.

Additionally, a funeral service for a long standing member of our congregation raised £585. At the specific request of the family, this amount was put into the fund for the speakers

#### Overview

This is the 2nd consecutive year when a significant deficit has occurred reducing our overall funds by nearly £20,000 and although the greater part of that amount has been spent on the new organ and speakers the PCC is conscious that a concerted effort in increasing the regular giving is a priority.

A new scheme is being run in many parishes and dioceses across England supported by the Church of England called the Parish Giving Scheme. The benefits in increased giving have been very significant so we are looking at this scheme to consider implementing it in the very near future

#### **Electoral Roll 2019**

Following the full revision in 2019, there were 70 people on the Electoral Roll. This was a decrease of 15 from the previous year. As the name suggests, anyone who is on the electoral roll is eligible to vote at elections for PCC members and for Church Wardens. It also allows one to be nominated for the PCC. Over the past few years no election has taken place at the Annual Parish Meeting as nominations have matched the number of vacancies.

Getting people to put their names forward for the positions is sometimes difficult, but if you have time and skills to offer, I would urge you to consider standing for nomination as a PCC member. New energy and ideas are vital for the growth of our church. There is much going on in church matters generally. Please consider prayerfully whether you could serve in this way.

## **Gift Aid Report**

Gift Aid receipts make an essential contribution to the finances of All Saints'. This table shows where gift-aided giving came from in 2019.

This giving resulted in two gift-aid receipts which came to £7,547, the last one for £5,497 covering the period from April 6<sup>th</sup> to December 31<sup>st</sup>.

All Saints' now qualifies for the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme. This scheme provides for a payment which matches Gift Aid on the anonymous small cash donations given in the collections. A claim was made for the 2017/18 and 2018/19 tax years. A payment of £1,320 was received on giving of £5,281.

Deanery Synod		

The Whitkirk Deanery Synod has three normal meetings during the year and at present they are combined with those of other Leeds deaneries, held in St. George's Church, Leeds. There is a plenary session at which our bishop and archdeacon have something to say and then there is a session on some topic of interest or importance. During the last 12 months, they have featured the latest Diocesan Strategy, WYDAN (West Yorkshire Destitute Asylum Seekers Network) and training people to adopt new forms of ministry. The diocese has produced a 'toolkit' to assist parishes in working out ways of doing things relevant in their particular areas.

Plans for reshaping the deanery structure are well advanced and Alan Stanley, from our Benefice, has had a lot to do with this.

#### Church Warden's Report 2019 -2020

The year has seen many changes in our worship and general church life but we must start by saying a big thanks you to Neale for filling the gap in Carole's absence and for providing additional support on her return to duties of Warden. We Wardens would not be able to fulfil our responsibilities regarding the Church without the vast team of volunteers who provide support to us in all areas of the Church life. Thank you.

Our growth in the area of children and young families has been heartening, strengthening relations with Barwick School. We have introduced a new communion service on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of every month aimed at children and young families and involving All Saints' All Stars. Messy Church once a month, involving reception year pupils from Barwick School, the pre-school children from the nursery at Barwick Methodist church and families from our congregation has been a huge success. As they say "it does exactly what it says on the tin". Children and adults have great fun and get extremely messy whilst exploring Gospel stories.

We have evolved as a stronger Church in our own Parish and have also seen the Benefice develop with more regular meetings of Clergy and wardens across the three Churches, pooling ideas. The Trinity service in 2019 was a joyful occasion seeing the congregations of the 3 distinct individual churches coming together to worship at All Saints'.

#### **External**

The Churchyard gang continue to maintain the churchyard to a very high standard and we are delighted to see new volunteers who have joined the team. In an attempt to ensure common standards in all churchyards, the Dioceses held a seminar in September and Carole attended on behalf of the Wardens. The aim is to ensure clear standards in all churchyards to provide a welcoming space, which our gardeners already achieve. Work is in hand to repair stonework around the church clock, replace the ties that anchor the clock face to the tower and then to paint and to refurbish the face.

## **Internal**

Internal work this year has included the replacement of the water boiler in the kitchen. The replacement and upgrade of the speakers for the organ, which itself was replaced in 2018, has enabled us to appreciate the full richness of the sound. Many thanks to Martyne White, our talented organist.

The critical question for the future is how can we make the space inside of our lovely church more flexible and welcoming without losing its beauty?

## All Saints Churchyard and Grounds Report

The year 2019 was a successful year for the Churchyard gang. The efforts of Janice and Lynda were well rewarded as the flower beds were probably the best they have ever been, with a profusion of flowers from spring to autumn. The Yorkshire in Bloom judges were so impressed that we were again awarded gold and Janice and Lynda's efforts were mentioned in their judging comments.

Sadly David McRae has decided he is no longer fit enough to be able to help us. David's efforts, especially with the paint brush will be sadly missed. On the bright side we gained Mick Watson who seems very handy with a lawnmower. Unfortunately, we were still short of help on many occasions so several of the regular tree pruning jobs etc were left undone. Early in the year Colin was about to order a couple of tons of topsoil for levelling graves, when Doug Haynes had a chance meeting with Paddy who was renovating a house in Gascoigne View, the result was several tons of good quality topsoil delivered free of charge, saving of a few hundred pounds for the Church.

In an effort to solve the problem of the ever growing mound of grave waste at the top of the extension, a meeting was held with Hartleys to try and sort out the problem. Things seemed to improve a little for a short while. However, the most recently dug or reopened graves have been left in an appalling state. The Rector has spoken to the grave diggers but with little effect. This is a serious problem which needs to be addressed quickly, otherwise the graveyard will become an eyesore rather than a place of calm and beauty for family and friends to visit.

The Churchyard Gang are still doing their utmost to keep the churchyard at its best for people to visit the graves of their loved ones. My thanks during this period of lockdown goes especially to Doug and Lynda who have carried on whilst those of us in lockdown have been confined to our homes.
